USFUVG Held 2023 Fall Event in Washington, DC

USFUVG held its first in-person event since the pandemic on Thursday, October 12, 2023, at the stunning Organization of American States building in Washington, DC. The Patio Azteca, where the cocktail reception was held, was brimming with over 130 guests and dignitaries.

The focus for the event was the essential work UVG and its students are doing analyzing the effects of pollutants and climate change on Lake Atitlán The featured speaker was UVG alum, Juan "Estuardo" Bocel. Estuardo Bocel: UVG Success Story



When UVG graduate Estuardo Bocel took the podium to tell his story at the OAS in October 2023, he revealed it was the first speech he has delivered entirely in English.

Estuardo was raised in Sololá, a town overlooking Lake Atitlán. His family is Kakchiquel, one of the Indigenous Maya of the Guatemalan highlands. He remembers his mother telling him about the importance of education. She attended school only until the 3rd grade, which was more than his father, who never went to school. Nonetheless, he still learned how to write, read, and do basic mathematics, and started his own grocery distribution business.

As a teenager, Estuardo attended school in the morning and helped

his father in the afternoon. One day, he returned to the office to find his mother crying. His father had been shot by thieves, shattering his femur. He needed surgery, and his recovery time was estimated at over a year.

Estuardo quit school and took over the business, now the sole provider for the family of six. He thought he'd never return to his education. His mother found a school he could attend on weekends. He did well, and was invited to apply to UVG Altiplano, where he did his final two years of high school. After graduation he stayed on to pursue a college degree in Agroforestry.

His grandfather told Estuardo that he should abandon his studies because education was not useful for Kakchiqueles. He wanted him to focus solely on providing for the family. Bucking tradition, Estuardo stayed the course.

In 2012, he started volunteering at UVG's Center for the Study of Lake Atitlán, which was founded in response to the algae bloom in the lake in 2009. Caused by pollution, mostly human waste and fertilizer runoff, the algae adversely impacted the more than 350,000 people who rely on the lake.

Estuardo worked at the lab for 11 years, later becoming its manager. He is now pursuing a master's degree at University of Nevada in Ecology with a focus on limnology, the study of inland waters. His goal is to put his knowledge to use helping Atitlán and the many other lakes in Guatemala.

"If it wasn't for UVG's scholarship program and all the opportunities provided to me, I wouldn't be where I am today," he says, adding, "Now my grandpa is encouraging the younger generation to go to school. I never thought I would be an example to follow, especially when I remember how hard it was to go against my culture. Nothing makes me happier than when young people have higher education as one of their goals."

UVG Launches USAID Funded Project "Inspiring Youth through Innovation and Ingenuity"



USFUVG is proud to have facilitated the funding of a 2million-dollar grant awarded by the USAID program for American Schools and Hospitals Abroad (ASHA) to UVG. The funds will be used to purchase cutting-edge equipment that will enable UVG students on all three campuses to propose and pilot innovative and ingenious solutions to various problems that Guatemala faces.

On April 12, 2024, a launch event at UVG was attended by the US ambassador to Guatemala, Tobin Bradley; UVG adminstrators; and USFUVG board members. USFUVG has partnered with ASHA since 1979 to raise

funds to improve higher education in Guatemala through UVG. This alliance has resulted in nearly 29 million dollars in aid for buildings and equipment.

Rotary Clubs Fund UVG Environmental Project at Lake Atitlán





USFUVG received two \$5,000 grants for UVG's Center for Studies at Lake Atitlán from two Rotary clubs—the South Everett/Mukilteo Rotary Club and the Rotary Club of Washington, D.C. The grants fund a project to decrease pollutants in Lake Atitlán and restore the health of the lake by educating residents of San Andres Semetabaj area in micro watershed management using a multi-disciplinary approach. It is hoped that this project will serve as a pilot that is scalable to other indigenous Maya villages and other micro watersheds surrounding Lake Atitlán. The Rotary Club of Guatemala City will be the sponsoring club in Guatemala (a requirement for international Rotary grants). They also pledged \$1,000 in support of the project.

Many members of the Rotary Club of Washington, DC were in attendance at the 2023 USFUVG Fall Event, where they learned about the challenges facing Lake Atitlán and the indigenous Maya who live around it. The Rotarians were so impressed with USFUVG and UVG, they wanted to do more. They hosted an event on November 15, 2023, at the Guatemalan Ambassador's residence to fundraise for USFUVG and scholarships for UVG students. They later presented a check for an additional \$5,000 to USFUVG.

USFUVG and UVG express our heartfelt gratitude to these Rotarians and their clubs for their generosity in taking action and investing in projects that have a tremendous environmental, humanitarian, and educational impact.
